Largest Attack

Starting Friday, the Taliban launched a series of attacks on Ghazni City and its rural outskirts that lasted several days. By the end of the attack, authorities estimated at least 200 people had been killed.

Attackers

Al-Shabaab claimed two attacks and are suspected in three more. On Tuesday suspected Al-Shabaab militants shot a civilian to death at Ansaloti Bridge in Mogadishu's Hamar-Jabab neighborhood. The next day, five Kenyan soldiers were killed and six more injured by an IED ambush in Kwa Omolo. Al-Shabaab claimed the attack. On Thursday five Red Crescent aid workers were kidnapped by suspected Al-Shabaab militants from Busley, Somalia. The same day seven Ugandan peacekeepers were killed in Ooryoley, Somalia. Al-Shabaab claimed the attack. On Friday, militants entered villages in Gedweyne, Somalia and overtook them. For unknown reasons, soldiers in the area had vacated the towns. No casualties were reported in the attack authorities suspect was carried out by Al-Shabaab.

The **Baloch Liberation Army** (**BLA**) claimed an attack in <u>Dalbandin</u>, Pakistan where a suicide attack targeted a civilian vehicle. Five people were injured.

Boko Haram is suspected in seven attacks, all in Nigeria. Five suicide bombers targeted a neighborhood in Kalari on Monday, but left no casualties other than themselves. The next day, soldiers stormed Munduri with guns and RPGs. Seven people were killed and several buildings were burned down. On Wednesday in Damasak, suspected Boko Haram militants killed fifteen soldiers and one aid worker. The same day, more militants targeted a military base in Garunda, killing seventeen and injuring fourteen. Another military base was attacked that day in Malamaforti, killing eleven. The next day, an attack on a military base in Garanda injured eight. On Saturday, two female suicide bombers

entered Madagali and detonate personal devices, killing ten.

The **Communist Party of Nepal (CPN)** is being blamed for one attack on the <u>Biratnagar</u> Metropolitan City Office. No casualties resulted.

The Islamic State of Iraq and Syria (ISIS) are suspected in three attacks this week, all in Iraq. On Wednesday the group attacked an army checkpoint in Mutaibija, killing four and injuring two. Five family members who were all part of a paramilitary militia group were killed in another checkpoint attack in Albu Jawari on Saturday. A sixth victim was injured. The same day, an IED killed two and injured ten in Sanjej.

Naxals (CPI) branch claimed an attack in <u>Kamalapada</u>, India. The group killed a postmaster they suspected of being a police informant.

Naxals claimed one attack and are being blamed for three more, all in India. On Tuesday, an IED in Chintalnar injured a soldier. On Thursday, Naxals set construction vehicles on fire in Bacheli. The same day, in nearby Bailadila, militants set a bus on fire in a similar attack. Neither occurrence left any casualties. On Friday, Naxals killed a suspected police informant in Bade Gudra.


The **New People's Army (NPA)** is suspected in one attack this week in <u>Lapinig</u>, Philippines, where they attacked a police station and injured two people.

The PKK are also suspected in one attack in Hakkari, Turkey, where an airstrike killed one and injured five.

The **Taliban** claimed one attack and are suspected in one more. On Thursday, a suspected Taliban suicide bomber killed two and injured ten more in <u>Herat</u>. Starting Friday, the Taliban launched a series of attacks on <u>Ghazni</u> City and its rural outskirts that lasted several days. By the end of the attack, authorities estimated at least 200 people had been killed.

Tehreek-e-Taliban Pakistan (**TTP**) are being blamed for an attack on a military patrol in <u>Janikhel</u>, Pakistan. No casualties resulted.

Eight attacks were the work of unknown attackers.



Regions

Middle East

Afghanistan suffered five attacks this week. On Tuesday, an IED killed a US soldier in Helmand. The next day, another IED struck a family vehicle in Shulgar, killing eight and injuring six. No group claimed responsibility for either attack. On Thursday, a suspected Taliban suicide bomber killed two and injured ten more in Herat. The same day a sticky bomb in Puli Alam killed one an injured two.Starting Friday, the Taliban launched a series of attacks on Ghazni City and its rural outskirts that lasted several days. By the end of the attack, authorities estimated at least 200 people had been killed.

Iraq was hit by three attacks this week. ISIS is suspected in all three. On Wednesday the group attacked an army checkpoint in Mutaibija, killing four and injuring two. Five family members who were all part of a paramilitary militia group were killed in another checkpoint attack in Albu Jawari on Saturday. A sixth victim was injured. The same day, an IED killed two and injured ten in Sanjej.

Jordan suffered its first attack of the year on Friday when a roadside IED in <u>Fuheis</u> killed one member of Jordan's security forces and injured six more.

Africa

Kenya suffered one attack on Wednesday when five Kenyan soldiers were killed and six more injured by an IED ambush Kwa Omolo.

Nigeria was hit by eight attacks this week, the most of any other country. Five suicide bombers targeted a neighborhood in Kalari on Monday, but left no casualties other than themselves. The next day, soldiers stormed Munduri with guns and RPGs. Seven people were killed and several buildings were burned down. On Wednesday in Damasak, suspected Boko Haram militants killed fifteen soldiers and one aid worker. The same day, more militants targeted a military base in Garunda, killing seventeen and injuring fourteen. Another military base was attacked that day in Malamaforti, killing eleven. The next day, an attack on a military base in Garanda injured eight. On Friday, militants entered Ikuryav Tiev village and killed nine of its inhabitants. On Saturday, two female suicide bombers entered Madagali and detonate personal devices, killing ten.

Somalia suffered four attacks this week. On Tuesday suspected Al-Shabaab militants shot a civilian to death at Ansaloti Bridge in Mogadishu's Hamar-Jabab neighborhood. On Thursday five Red Crescent aid workers were kidnapped by suspected Al-Shabaab militants from Busley, Somalia. The same day seven Ugandan peacekeepers were killed in Qoryoley, Somalia. Al-Shabaab claimed the attack. On Friday, militants entered villages in Gedweyne, Somalia and overtook them. For unknown reasons, soldiers in the area had vacated the towns. No casualties were reported in the attack authorities suspect was carried out by Al-Shabaab.

Asia-Pacific

India was hit by six attacks this week. On Tuesday, a suspected Naxal IED in Chintalnar injured a soldier. The next day, Naxals' (CPI) branch claimed an attack in Kamalapada, India where the group killed a postmaster they suspected of being a police informant. On Thursday, Naxals set construction vehicles on fire in Bacheli. The same day, in nearby Bailadila, militants set a bus on fire in a similar attack. Neither occurrence left any casualties. On Friday, Naxals killed a suspected police informant in Bade Gudra. On Sunday, unknown militants broke into a house in Murran, executing one of its residents and disposing of the body.

Nepal suffered two attacks this week. A bomb exploded in a factory in Dhangadhi on Thursday. On Sunday, the Communist Party of Nepal (CPN) attacked the Biratnagar Metropolitan City Office. No casualties resulted from either attack.

Pakistan was hit by three attacks this week. Tehreek-e-Taliban Pakistan (TTP) are being blamed for an attack on a military patrol in <u>Janikhel</u> on Monday. No casualties resulted. The Baloch Liberation Army (BLA) claimed an attack in <u>Dalbandin</u> on Saturday. A suicide attack targeted a civilian vehicle and injured five. On Sunday, a 10-kilogram IED attached to a motorcycle detonated <u>Chaman</u>, killing one and injuring ten.

Western Europe and Others

Turkey suffered one attack in in Hakkari, where an airstrike killed one and injured five. The PKK are being blamed.
