Largest Attack

On Wednesday, fifteen people were killed and twenty-nine injured in an attack by the Taliban on British security contractors in Kabul.

Attackers

Al-Shabaab claimed two attacks and is suspected in one more. On Wednesday, Al-Shabaab detonated two IEDs outside a religious compound in Galkayo, Somalia that played music during their service killing seventeen and injuring twenty. The same day, suspected members of the group detonated a car bomb in Mogadishu's Wadajir neighborhood near a group of soldiers. On Sunday a car bomb placed beneath a police car in Mogadishu, killing one and injuring two.

Boko Haram claimed one attack and is suspected in two more. On Wednesday, two members of Boko Haram were killed, and twenty-nine civilians injured in a suicide attack at a market in Amchide, Cameroon. The same day, the group claimed an attack in Jiddari-Polo, Nigeria killing four and injuring one. On Saturday, a suicide attack in Maiduguri, Nigeria injured five.


Islamic State of West Africa Province (ISWAP) claimed one attack and is suspected in one more. On Friday, ISWAP militants killed eight and injured seventeen in an attack on a military base in <u>Gamboru</u>. The next day, the group attacked another military base in <u>Buni Gari</u>, killing two and injuring five.

Naxals are suspected in three attacks this week. On Tuesday, one person was injured in an IED blast in Chattisgarh district. Maoist rebels were responsible for the attack. On Friday, a group of Naxals kidnapped several road workers and torched their vehicles in Gadchiroli, India. On Sunday a group of suspected Naxals killed a man they believed to be a police informant in Bastar.

New People's Army (NPA) are suspected in one attack this week. On Tuesday, one person was killed and another injured by the New People's Army (NPA) in <u>Northern Samar.</u>

Taliban claimed two attacks this week. On Tuesday, three US soldiers were killed and one civilian wounded by a bomb in Ghazini city. The Taliban is responsible for the attack. On Wednesday, ten were killed and nineteen injured in an attack by the Taliban on British security contractors in Kabul.

Ugandan Allied Democratic Forces are suspected in two attacks this week. On Wednesday, the Ugandan Allied Democratic Forces killed six civilians in Oicha, DRC. Another attack in Oicha killed two the same day.



Regions

Middle East

Afghanistan suffered two attacks this week. On Tuesday, three US soldiers were killed and one civilian wounded by a bomb in Ghazini city. The Taliban is responsible for the attack. On Wednesday, fifteen were killed and twenty-nine injured in an attack by the Taliban on British security contractors in Kabul. This was the week's largest attack.

Iraq was hit by one attack on Thursday, one was killed and four injured from an IED blast in the <u>Diyala</u>province. The militants are unidentified.

Israel suffered two attacks this week. On Wednesday, three soldiers were injured in a vehicle ramming in Gush Etzion.

On Friday, two were injured in an attack by a man in <u>Eilat</u>. The motives of the assailant are unknown, but it may have been an act of terror.

Africa

Cameroon was hit by one attack this week. On Wednesday, two members of Boko Haram were killed, and twenty-nine civilians injured in a suicide attack at a market in <u>Amchide</u>.

Democratic Republic of the Congo suffered two attacks this week. On Wednesday, the Ugandan Allied Democratic Forces killed six civilians in <u>Oicha</u>. Another attack in <u>Oicha</u> killed two the same day.

Nigeria was hit by four attacks this week. On Wedesday, Al-Shabaab claimed an attack in <u>Jiddari-Polo</u>, killing four and injuring one. On Friday, ISWAP militants killed eight and injured seventeen in an attack on a military base in <u>Gamboru</u>. The next day, the group attacked another military base in <u>Buni Gari</u>, killing two and injuring five. On Saturday, a Boko Haram suicide attack in <u>Maiduguri</u> injured five.

Somalia suffered three attacks this week. On Wednesday, Al-Shabaab detonated two IEDs outside a religious compound in <u>Galkayo</u>, Somalia that played music during their service killing seventeen and injuring twenty. The same day, suspected members of the group detonated a car bomb in Mogadishu's <u>Wadajir</u> neighborhood near a group of soldiers. On Sunday a car bomb placed beneath a police car in <u>Mogadishu</u>, killing one and injuring two.


Asia Pacific

Burkina Faso suffered its first attack since October. On Saturday, a roadside bomb killed five people, including four police officers while they were escorting gold mine workers in <u>Boungou</u>.

India was hit by six attacks this week. On Tuesday, one person was injured in an IED blast in Chattisgarh district. Maoist rebels were responsible for the attack. The next day, unknown attackers threw grenades at the homes of two political candidates in Tral. On Thursday, unknown attackers killed a pro-tribal leader and his guard in Bajaur. On Friday, a group of Naxals kidnapped several road workers and torched their vehicles in Gadchiroli. On Saturday, unknown attackers detonated an IED on a train in Harisinga, but left no casualties. On Sunday a group of suspected Naxals killed a man they believed to be a police informant in Bastar.

Philippines suffered two attacks this week. On Tuesday, one person was killed and another injured by the New People's Army (NPA) in Northern Samar. On Sunday, unknown attackers lobbed a grenade at a municipal official's home in Pagalungan, injuring one.
